MAJOR POINTS FROM DAVID FRUGE, KAREN HOLLAND AND MORNING AND AFTERNOON Q&A

Lessons Learned From Great Lakes and Louisiana

- The agency/stakeholder partnership must be real, in terms of funding, time commitments and contribution of ideas. Continue looking for stakeholders as program matures. (Holland)
- Identify potential bottlenecks for implementing ecosystem restoration programs (Fruge).
- Identify a selection process and criteria for funding long term and short term projects. (Fruge)

- Success of the Louisiana project hinges on the big and high cost projects.
- There must be a balance between research and implementing projects (Holland).

Q&A

- Identify the suite of indicators to be used to measure progress towards achieving Program goals and objectives.
- Clarify which targets provide more than one benefit.
- The program will revisit the Ecosystem Quality objectives.
- CALFED should initially develop a vision that maximizes restoration efforts. It is easier to scale back than to increase restoration initiatives.
